Hello again, South Weber Citizens!

I hope you all had a wonderful holiday season! Thanks so much to all of you who donated to the City Angel Tree last month. Many grateful families were blessed with a joyous holiday season because of your generous donations. What a great community we have here in South Weber!

I wanted to inform you of some things that are going on at Parson's Gravel Pit. You might have noticed some excavation going on along the west end of the pit. This grade work and clean-up is in preparation for a masonry wall that Parson's is in the process of installing to help mitigate windblown sand at the west end of the pit. The wall installation itself is a few months out as the contractor is backlogged with other projects. Parsons is also improving several conveyor transfer points to assist in limiting dust blow off, as well as improving water truck access to some areas previously unattainable. Pond fine materials continue to be placed over exposed slopes to reduce concentrations of airborne sand particles.

Also, construction on HWY 89 will hopefully begin this Summer. We have 2 liaisons from South Weber that sit on the US 89 Community Coordination Team board; our representatives are Quin Soderquist and Lance Nelson. They will meet monthly with UDOT officials, construction managers and adjacent cities to discuss the progress of the US 89; Farmington to I-84 project, voice concerns, and ask questions. Quin and Lance have set up a gmail account where residents can send in questions, comments, and/or input about the project; the gmail account is [southweberhwy89input@gmail.com](mailto:southweberhwy89input@gmail.com). The City is also working to put updated information on the City website.

I want to wish you all a Happy New Year. Please know that South Weber Staff and Council are working hard to make the new year better than ever for South Weber City.

In accordance with the South Weber City Snow & Ice Removal Policy, snow plowing and/or ice control operations shall commence under the direction of the on-call Public Works Employee. Notice of plowing need is typically provided from the Davis County Sheriff's Deputy on duty during late night hours. Snow removal operations will begin in accordance with the following criteria:

- A. Snow accumulations of one inch (1") or less
- B. Snow accumulations greater than one inch but less than three inches (1"-3")
- C. Snow accumulations greater than three inches (3"+)

Streets will be plowed and salted according to the following established priority. Priorities are set based on traffic volume, public safety, access to Emergency Response Facilities, and schools.

- A. Major Collector Streets
  - a. 475 E
  - b. 1900 E
  - c. 2100 E
  - d. Deer Run Drive
  - e. Highway 89 Frontage Roads
- B. Minor Collector Streets – all other city owned streets
- C. Cul-de-sacs
- D. Sidewalks traversing all city owned properties.

The Park & Ride is to be contracted through a third party. The City does not have a bare asphalt snow removal policy; however, operations will continue until roads are passable. Safety of the plow operators and the public is important. Therefore, snowplowing/removal operations may be terminated after 12 to 14 hours to allow City Personnel adequate time for recovery. Operations may also be suspended during time periods of limited visibility, significant winds or drifting snow to not jeopardize the safety of city employees and equipment.

### Code Enforcement Notes

According to Cottrell in *Evaluating and Improving Pedestrian Safety in Utah*, the failure to remove snow on sidewalks and shoulders creates multiple safety hazards for pedestrians. Sidewalks that have not been cleared, force pedestrians to either use the facility in unsafe conditions (frequent slips and falls) or to walk in the street. Crosswalks and curb ramps are frequently blocked by snow either because it is dumped by plows or because neither the homeowner nor the snow crews clear it.

How a jurisdiction handles snow removal from sidewalks and paved shared-use paths is also an ADA issue. Snow removal is treated differently because of its temporary nature and because responsibility for clearing the snow is diffused. However, there is a legal obligation to remove snow within a reasonable period of time. Most jurisdictions need to have a plan in place to do it, and snow removal programs must include clearing curb ramps.

### Business Licenses

Please be aware that a 50% penalty will be assessed to the license fee for all business license renewals which have not been paid by January 31, 2019, and a 100% penalty will be assessed to the fee for any business license renewal which has not been paid by February 28<sup>th</sup>.
