### Let's Get Utah Connected!

South Weber Residents, there's a new dawn in connectivity that's moving at the speed of light, fiber optic internet. Fiber optics is the technology used to transmit information as pulses of light through strands of fiber made of glass over long distances. These fibers are about the diameter of a strand of hair and when bundled into fiber optic cable, they're capable of transmitting more data over longer distances and faster than other mediums. The goal is to bring the speed of fiber to every residence in South Weber.

Local Internet service provider Connext specializes in the installation and management of fiber optic infrastructure. The locally owned and operated company based in Ogden is currently investing heavily in Northern Utah communities. Connext is privately funding the construction and installation of the fiber throughout each city Connext performs the infrastructure installations. Connext and South Weber City Officials are currently planning a citywide build out to connect every home at NO COST to city residents.

When the installation is complete, Connext will offer the best internet value in the region with the capacity to offer up to a 10GBPS symmetrical connection to every household in South Weber.

### **CPR Awareness**

Every year an estimated 400,000 cardiac arrests occur outside of the hospital setting. Roughly 7 out of 10 of them occur at home. You can help improve the outcome of a loved one or someone in the general public by being aware of the signs and symptoms of a heart attack or cardiac arrest, and how to perform CPR.

You don't need a special certification or formal training to perform CPR, but you do need education. If cardiac arrest happens to someone near you, don't be afraid - just be prepared! Follow these steps if you see someone in cardiac arrest:

- Call 911 right away. If another bystander is nearby, save time by asking
  that person to call 911 and look for an automated external defibrillator
  external icon (AED) while you begin CPR. AEDs are portable machines
  that can electrically shock the heart and cause it to start beating again.
  - Where can you find an AED? The City has accessible AED's at the Rec Center, City Office, and both elementary schools.
- Give CPR. Push down hard and fast in the center of the chest at a rate
  of 100 to 120 pushes a minute. Let the chest come back up to its
  normal position after each push. The American Heart Association
  (AHA) recommends timing your pushes to the beat of the song "Stayin'
  Alive". This method of CPR is called "hands-only" and does not involve
  breathing into the person's mouth.

#### **Heart Attack Warning Signs**

- Uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain in the center of your chest. It lasts more than a few minutes, or goes away and comes back.
- Pain or discomfort in one or both arms, your back, neck, jaw or stomach.
- Shortness of breath with or without chest discomfort.
- Other signs such as breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.
- Continue giving CPR until medical professionals arrive or until a person with formal CPR training can take over.

Currently, about 1 in 10 people who have cardiac arrest outside the hospital die. But CPR can help improve those odds. if it is performed in the first few minutes of cardiac arrest, CPR can double or triple a person's chance of survival.

The instructions above will help you be prepared in case something like this happens in your home.

### **Be Cautious!**

We understand that it is frigid outside, but we would like to remind you to not leave unattended vehicles running to warm them up. This only creates an opportunity to have your vehicle stolen, and we want to deter criminals from coming into our city by keeping our property secure. The theory is, if the opportunity to commit a crime is limited, those seeking to commit a crime will choose someplace else.

# South Weber Citizen Spotlight

Arthur was born on December 4, 1924 in Helena Alfalfa Co., Oklahoma during the depression years. He learned the meaning of hard work and sacrifice, which he passed on to his family.

As a young lad, he was helping clear land when suddenly he was bitten by a copperhead rattlesnake and became very ill. After several weeks, he recovered and luckily survived.

Art loved sports and was a very good basketball player.

His mother died in November of 1941, and his father followed only a month later in December 1941. Art was 17 years old.

On December 7, 1941, the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor. When Art turned 18, he was called to serve in World War II.



He was assigned to the infantry and fought many battles. During one conflict, he was hit in his right leg by a bullet. His Sargent crawled by him, told him to grab his belt, and drug him to safety. After he recovered, he was reassigned to his unit. While on patrol, he was again injured, this time more serious and was sent to Bushnell General Hospital in Brigham City. Later he received a Purple Heart with additional recognitions. While recovering at the hospital, he met someone very special, the love of his life, Lola Ukena. They were later married. After recovering from his injuries, he and Lola moved to Arkansas for a couple of years where their 2 oldest children were born.

They returned to Utah residing in Clearfield. In 1953, Art moved his family to South Weber, Together, him and his brother Dawson bought property and started a Grade A Dairy Farm with over 30 cows. Art also had an apricot orchard with the sweetest apricots in town and grew crops of peas that were harvested and processed at the old pea vinery on the corner of 1900 E. South Weber Drive.

He retired from HAFB, worked in many church positions, served on the South Weber Town Council, and numerous committees helping with early projects such as building the first city hall, developing the first city park, and served many years as president of the South Weber Water District.

As a Veteran of World War II, he was privileged to participate in one of the Honor Flights recognizing veterans. Recently, he was honored by the Quilts of Valor Foundation where he was presented his own personal quilt of valor.

He loves to watch sports, especially bull riding and the Utah Jazz.

This past December, Art turned 97. He takes care of himself and his mind is sharp as a tack. He and Lola (deceased 2010) have 6 children, their posterity of grandchildren and great-grandchildren has grown over 100, including several 5 generations. He is an inspiration of love and support for his family. His family loves him and are proud of his sacrifice for our country. They are thankful each day he is with them.
