Title: Snow Removal

BACKGROUND

The staff is working on ideas for maintaining the new sidewalk up by the charter school. We are still working on getting the cost that would be involved for the City to take on that responsibility either through a contractor that can handle the job or through new City equipment and manpower. In either scenario, if the City takes on the responsibility, an ordinance or policy needs to be set in place to allow this to happen. A draft of such an ordinance amendment is attached. Staff has investigated and found that there are other communities that maintain large stretches of sidewalk on vacant lots.

7-1-2: REMOVAL OF SNOW:



A. Failure To Remove Unlawful: It shall be unlawful for the owner, occupant, lessor or agent of any property, abutting on a paved sidewalk, to fail to remove or have removed from such paved sidewalk, all hail, snow or sleet thereon within a reasonable time after such snow, hail or sleet has fallen. In the case of a storm between the hours of five o'clock (5:00) P.M. and six o'clock (6:00) A.M., such sidewalks shall be cleaned before nine o'clock (9:00) A.M. of the same day.

Exception: In circumstances where the property has over 200 feet of street frontage, is vacant of use with no structures, and is within one-quarter mile of a school, the city will be responsible for removal of snow from the sidewalk within a reasonable time.

B. Depositing In Gutter Unlawful: It shall be unlawful for any person removing snow from the sidewalk or driveway or other areas, to deposit or blow snow, dirt, leaves or any other material in the street, nor should any of these materials be deposited in the gutter so as to clog or prevent the free flow of water therein. (1989 Code § 11-361)

Title: Sidewalk Matching Program

RECOMMENDATION

Provide direction to staff on how to proceed with idea.

BACKGROUND

Staff has gone through all of the sidewalk repair requests that were in the request log system through August 2013. Looking at each one, Mark provided a rating 1-10 (10 being the worst) and a length required for repair.

Based on this information, we have a total of 1618 linear feet of sidewalk, 565 linear feet of curb/gutter/driveway approach, and 3 trip hazards. Of these, Mark has identified 810 linear feet of sidewalk, 365 linear feet of curb/gutter/driveway approach, and 2 trip hazards that need repair sooner than later.

Based on the contract prices we had for 2012 as an estimate, we are looking at:

\$28 / linear foot for sidewalk: Total Requests: \$45,304

Identified as Needing Repair Sooner than Later by Mark: \$22,680

\$29.50/ liner foot for curb/gutter/drive:

Total Requests: \$16,667.50

Identified as Needing Repair Sooner than Later by Mark: \$10,767.50

Totals: \$61.971.50 for all requests through August 2013 OR \$33,447.50 if we do what is absolutely needed. *This cost is based off of last year's construction bid price, so the numbers could go up/down based on today's costs. This also does not take into account the requests we have received for installation of sidewalk where there currently is none. Funding for the sidewalk replacement comes from the City's road construction fund, we currently have \$15,000 budgeted this year for this work.

Due to the fact that we are continually running into the issue of more requests than we have money and a significant amount of sidewalk replacement – Staff would like to investigate a sidewalk matching funds program. Basically, in this program the City would match up to a certain amount of funding, would hire the contractor to do the work

(do the work through the City in one go), and the resident would pay a percentage of the cost up front (or something similar to that idea).

Staff met and discussed this idea, however, before we go to the work of proposing/creating a program, we wanted to get your input and feelings on it.

The City of Marysville Sidewalk Improvement Program

Introduction:

In early 2007, the City of Marysville implemented a *Sidewalk Repair Program* pilot project. This pilot allowed a sensible and efficient approach to maintaining our City sidewalks. By identifying areas needing improvement, prioritizing and tracking repairs, the City will be better able to provide for pedestrian safety and reduce property owner liability for trip and fall incidents. Well maintained sidewalks also improve the appearance of neighborhoods and increase property values. In 2008 this pilot program was continued and modified to include businesses and all properties located within the City of Marysville.

By codified ordinance, property owners are completely responsible for maintaining the sidewalks adjacent to their property, which includes sidewalks that run along a public street. However, as part of this pilot program, the City of Marysville is allocating 50/50 matching funds to help repair sidewalk sections deemed hazardous, as well as provide for installation of new sidewalks in areas currently without. This program is available to all residents and businesses located in the City of Marysville. New constructions in subdivisions where sidewalks are required are not eligible for funding.

This will be an annual program with funding as provided through the City budget. A maximum of \$1500 may be directed to each individual property owner's project request:

Example:

- 1. \$4,000 of work gets \$1,500 match from City and costs property owner \$2,500.
- 2. \$3,000 of work gets \$1,500 match from City and costs property owner \$1,500.
- 3. \$2,000 of work gets \$1,000 match from City and costs property owner \$1,000.

It is a current estimate that a 4ft by 4ft section of sidewalk may cost \$200 dollars to replace or install. Thus, each project may include approximately 15 square sections of concrete. Repair work to existing sidewalk that involves work other than replacement is encouraged.

To determine if your sidewalk qualifies for repair under the program, a sidewalk is rated on a scale 0 through 5 with 5 representing the most severe damage. As part of the program, sidewalk sections will be scored 0 through 5 and the individual projects ranked according to the total score. Sidewalk

sections rated 5, 4 or 3 will qualify for repair as funds become available. Sidewalks rated 0, 1 or 2 will not qualify for matching funds but the scoring will be included to determine rankings for funding.

New sidewalk installations will be scored on a scale of 1 through 5 based on categories of *Neighborhood Coordination, Connectivity*, and *Proximity to Schools*. Applications for new sidewalk installations will start with a base score of 15 and additional points will be added based on the above categories. The scoring will be used to rank projects for funding along with the repair requests.

Property owners whose sidewalks are not selected for improvement due to lack of funding are encouraged to proceed with the project on their own or wait for additional funding (reimbursement will not be issued for work completed without prior approval). **Driveway approaches and aprons are not eligible for matching funds.** To determine what priority your sidewalk damage rates, please complete and submit a Sidewalk Improvement Program Application Form.

Participation:

Residential properties and businesses located in the City of Marysville shall be eligible for participation in this program. A property owner should complete the following steps in order to gain consideration for matching funds:

- 1.) Submit a completed Sidewalk Improvement Program application along with an estimate from a licensed and approved contractor, as well as the required zoning permit application. The contractor you choose to perform your work MUST be registered with the City of Marysville or get registered prior to performing the work.
- 2.) The City will rate and approve/disapprove the project. If approved, the City will waive the Sidewalk Permit Fee. The City will assign a deadline for project completion and final payment submission. If not approved, the project may be resubmitted based on future funding. The City may waive the Sidewalk Permit Fee for qualified projects that do not receive funding but that the Property owner proceeds with the project.
- 3.) Upon approval, work may commence. Once completed, submission of a final invoice of completed work should be submitted to the city. This invoice should show the completion of the project and the final project dollar amount. This invoice shall be from the licensed and approved contractor.
- 4.) The approved portion of the project shall be compensated in a 50/50 matching format up to \$500.00 in City funds. The approved amount will then be mailed to the property owner in a timely manner. The Property Owner is responsible for payment of the contractor.

This simple process not only allows for reimbursement up to \$1,500.00, but qualified projects also pay no permit fees. A property owner may use this project annually if their projects are approved and future funding continues.

Sidewalk Improvement Program FAQ:

1. Why did the City begin this program? Sidewalks are a very important means of travel for our residents, especially children and senior citizens. The City began this program in order to accomplish four primary goals: 1) improve defective sidewalks and ensure that walkways remain safe for all residents, 2) provide a low-cost and convenient sidewalk repair option to Marysville Property owners, 3) give residents


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the opportunity to add sidewalks to neighborhoods where they currently do not exist, and 4) maintain property values throughout the City.

- 2. I thought the City took care of sidewalks. Why do I have to pay for it? Sidewalks in Marysville are the responsibility of the property owner. Cities throughout Ohio may handle sidewalk maintenance differently. The City does not maintain sidewalks adjacent to private property and/or along a public street. This decision allows the City to commit more of our limited funds to road building, expansion and maintenance.
- **3.** Is the City making money off of this program? No. As a matter of fact this program is a way in which your tax dollars are used to improve our City's safety and increase property values.
- 4. What happens if I don't repair my sidewalk? Code enforcement may issue notices to those who have not participated in the program or have not completed their sidewalk repair independently. However, the goal of this project is not code enforcement, but to eliminate hazardous sidewalks and provide property owners a means to correct the hazard.
 - 5. What if the existing sidewalk is brick and in need of repair can it be repaired with brick or is concrete required? If the damage to historic brick sidewalk is deemed to qualify for reimbursement as part of the project and the owner wishes to replace the sidewalk with brick this may be acceptable provided the final result is in compliance with Section 521.06 of the Codified Ordinances which states "No owner or occupant of abutting lands shall fail to keep the sidewalks, curbs or gutters in repair and free from snow, ice or any nuisance." This work will only be reimbursable to the 50/50 or \$1,500 dollar limit. Replacement of existing concrete or stone sidewalks with brick will not be acceptable.
 - **6.** Are residential apartments eligible for funding? Apartment complexes are eligible for funding for sidewalks that are located along public streets. Single family or single family homes that have been converted to "twin-singles" that are used as residential rental properties are also eligible for funding. However, in both cases priority will be given to owner-occupied residences.
 - 7. I live on a corner lot am I eligible for additional funding because of two frontages? To encourage as much participation as possible, a \$1500 maximum per property is being put in place independent of the amount of sidewalk located per property.
 - 8. Can I use the money from this program to improve sidewalks that are located in my back yard, side yard or which go to my front door? No, the intent of this program is to improve sidewalks located along public streets. Other sidewalks on a property that are not along a public street are the responsibility of the property owner to improve and pay for.
 - **9. Who do I contact for more information?** Please contact the City's Engineering Division at 642-6015. Applications may be found at the Engineering Division offices in City Hall located at 125 East Sixth Street second floor.

New Sidewalk Installation Explanation:

New sidewalk requests will start with a base score of 15 points and additional points given based on the categories below:

Neighborhood Coordination

While it is encouraging if an individual installs new sidewalk where none currently exists, there are more benefits to the community if several property owners install sidewalk together. To encourage neighbors without sidewalks to participate in the program, points will be added based on the number of adjoining neighbors that participate in the program. An individual property owner that applies will receive 2 points in this category.

Connectivity

Recognizing that the connectivity of the sidewalks system is important for the pedestrian use of the system, points are awarded based on how the new sidewalk provides connectivity. Five (5) points will be given for a section of sidewalk that completes the sidewalks between the intersecting streets (a block). Three or four points will be given if the section does not complete the sidewalk within a block but adjoins existing sidewalks on either one or both sides. An individual with no adjoining sidewalks will receive 1 point for initiating sidewalk on the street.

Proximity to Schools

Providing school children with a safe passage to and from school is of utmost importance. Therefore, points will be added based on the property's proximity to a school. For a property located within 1,000 feet of school property, the maximum of 5 points will be granted. The points added will be based on distance from school property on intervals of between 1,000 feet and 2,500 feet, between 2,500 feet and 1 mile, and between 1 mile and 2 miles points. A minimum of 1 point will be given for any property greater than 2 miles from a school.

Therefore, maximum score for new sidewalk installation could be 30 points for a property meeting the highest criteria set. A minimum score of 19 will be provided based on minimum points awarded. Depending on the number of applicants for sidewalk improvements (both repair and new installations) a score of 19 could still be funded.

Sidewalk Improvement Program

1.) Identification

The pilot program is "resident-driven," meaning repair sites are identified by requests from the public. The pilot only addresses damage that poses a safety hazard, not aesthetic damage. Only sidewalks adjacent to residential single-family homes in the Uptown area are eligible under this pilot program.

4.) Application Schedule and Payment:

Applications will be accepted continuously starting January 1st as funds are available. Applications will be reviewed, ranked and approved for funding on a monthly basis after March 31, 2011. Applications will be accepted through October 31st.

Work will be expected to be completed within 60 days following notice of approval and shall be no later than December 1st.

All requests for reimbursement should be received by December 1st to allow processing of request before the end of the year.

Property Owners are responsible for payment to the Contractor.

Curb, Gutter, and Sidewalk

Sidewalk, Curb and Gutter Repair and Replacement Policy

Sidewalks Make Good Neighborhoods

Sidewalks have a way of tying together neighborhoods. Real estate professionals will attest that where sidewalks are good, the neighborhood becomes a more desirable place to live. Sidewalks serve so many purposes: recreation space for joggers and children with tricycles and pull toys, an informal meeting place for neighbors, and an encouragement for people to make more use of the most basic form of transportation – walking.

Be proud of your sidewalks. Take care of them and enjoy them.

Cottonwood Heights is committed to maintaining our curb, gutter, and sidewalks in the best condition possible. Each year the City Council budgets funds to repair and maintain our curb gutter and sidewalks. Once every 5 years the Public Works Department conducts a sidewalk condition inventory. From this inventory we budget funds to make repairs and install sidewalks in areas which have none. Residents can also report sidewalk that are in need of repair. The public works inspector will come and evaluate each maintenance request and the sidewalk repair will be prioritized according to the level of hazard it present. As requests are received by the City, one of three things will happen:

- 1. The sidewalk will be scheduled for grinding to remove the trip hazard. An eligible trip hazard is a vertical displacement not exceeding 1 1/2 inches in height. This type of request takes 60 to 90 days to repair.
- 2. If curb gutter or sidewalk are not a candidate for #1 above, the repair request will be placed on a list and prioritized according to the level of hazard it presents. The City repairs as many hazards as possible based on available funding.
- 3. The home or business owner may repair the sidewalk. The City has initiated a Matching Grant Curb, Gutter, Sidewalk Replacement c_{ij} Program to provide an opportunity for citizens to participate financially to expedite sidewalk repairs or replacement of eligible
- sidewalks. The City will fund 50% of the costs up to \$1000.

Sidewalk, curb, and gutter damaged by carelessness, neglect or by specific activities of the home owner such as construction are not eligible for this program.

The City of Enid Sidewalk Repair Partnership Program Outline of Application Process

APPLICATION: Acceptance is contingent upon the availability of matching funds and priority will be given to applications on the basis of the condition of the sidewalk, the need, and the scope of the project. Work that will result in a general improvement to pedestrian access, rather than provide only a localized benefit will be given priority. Landowners are encouraged to consider making an area wide application where appropriate.

QUALIFICATIONS: To qualify¹, the property must be located within City limits and have or have been developed with sidewalks, or the properties on either side of the subject property have or have been developed with sidewalks.

INSPECTION OF SITE: The City will inspect and photograph the sidewalk location sites to determine qualifications, condition, and limits of the project.

ESTIMATE OF COSTS: The City will then work-up a cost estimate for the sidewalk repair, and provide a Final Estimate to the property owner(s). Owners can then agree with the Final Estimate, (in order to be included in the program and proceed to the next steps); or, Non-Acceptance, (to withdraw from the program.) The City assumes 100% cost of any ADA compliance, where applicable. Residents are encouraged to seek their own estimates for work done on the non-participating portions, such as retaining walls.

APPROVAL: Final determination for approval of each sidewalk location will be made by the City of Enid after completion of the application process above, based on funds available, condition of the sidewalk, and priority of need.

AGREEMENT: After the City receives agreement of the Final Estimates, we send out Request for Proposals to contractors for the best possible proposal. Then "Actual Costs" are calculated, and may be less (or more) than the Final Estimate. An Official Agreement Form will then be sent with the Actual Cost, along with an Invoice.

INVOICE: Payment in full is requested within two (2) weeks of the Invoice date in order to schedule work. Any resident in the program can still withdraw in writing at this stage.

LIEN AND LOAN AGREEMENT: There is an option to pay with a Lien and Loan Agreement and have the cost assessed against the property to be paid back as provided for by the state as a sidewalk assessment/or as lien.

SCHEDULE OF WORK: The work is scheduled to begin once all Invoices are paid. Work progress may be subject to the weather or other construction interferences. The City officiates inspection of these projects from start to finish, and ensures ADA compliance where applicable.

FINAL INSPECTION: The City will schedule a final inspection of the work with the property owner before recommending final acceptance of the work.

50/50 Sidewalk Assistance Program

The 50/50 Sidewalk Assistance Program is offered to property owners in the City of Forney to replace or repair existing sidewalks throughout the City used for public pedestrian access. The City is offering to pay for half the cost for sidewalk repair or replacement. We currently offer two programs, the 50/50 Sidewalk Sucker Program and the 50/50 Sidewalk Replacement Program.

News and Information

The 50/50 Sidewalk Sucker Program is for sections of sidewalks that are still intact but has settled. Our Field Crew uses a new machine that will lift a complete section of your sidewalk up, move it to allow the area to be prepped and leveled then set back in place.

The 50/50 Sidewalk Replacement Program is for sections of sidewalk that need total replacement. The city uses a 3rd party contractor for the sidewalk replacement)

The following will provide you with information on how to apply for the program.

- 3. Upon receipt the Public Works Department Field Operations Supervisor or his designee will make a site assessment visit to see which program you qualify for. After the assessment you will be notified via email or mail, as designated on your form, of the findings and total cost associated.
- 4. Assessment Criteria To be eligible for the 50/50 Sidewalk Sucker Program the sidewalk cannot have any cracks or surface defects. If a sidewalk is found to have any cracks or surface defects it will automatically be recommended for the 50/50 Sidewalk Replacement Program.
- (5. Property owners will then have 30 days to accept the assessment and submit their portion of the cost. Upon receipt of the signed acceptance form and property owner assessment fee portion, we will give a notice to proceed to either our Field Staff or the 3rd Party Contractor. (If you are a candidate for the 50/50 Sidewalk Replacement Program a minimum dollar amount has to be met in order for the 3rd party contractor to mobilize. If the minimum is not met at the time of acceptance we will put your address on a list and notify you when the work will begin.

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PILOT SIDEWALK REPAIR PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM IN PASADENA

The proposed Pilot Sidewalk Repair Partnership Program would provide property owners with an economical and efficient means of replacing existing sidewalks when City tree roots cause the damage.

Background

While the Department of Public Works does provide temporary sidewalk repairs, Pasadena Municipal Code (PMC) Chapter 12:04:030 - Notice to Abutting Property Owner makes sidewalk repair the responsibility of the abutting properly owner even if a City street tree causes the damage, Property owners must repair damaged sidewalks or pay the City to make repairs before selling property. Currently property owners must also repair damaged sidewalks before the City will issue a building permit with a valuation of \$20,000 or more.

When a condominium is sold, the City calculates the total damaged sidewalk assessment for that parcel and divides it by the number of units on the parcel. Each unit is responsible for its share of the assessment.

A unit applying for an occupancy or building permit is similarly required to pay its proportional share of the sidewalk assessment. When the total damaged sidewalk assessment for that parcel is collected, the City will proceed with sidewalk repairs. Any time the City assesses a unit for its share of damages, the Department of Public Works contacts the condominium association to ascertain the association's interest in repairing damaged sidewalk along the parcel's entire frontage. In many instances, the condominium associations have elected to collaborate with the City to repair all damaged sidewalk.

Pilot Sidewalk Repair Partnership Program

The City of Pasadena recognizes that sidewalk maintenance and repair within the City is necessary to protect the health, safety, and welfare of residents and visitors.

The Pilot Sidewalk Repair Partnership Program would provide owners who are not engaged in the sale of or building permit process for the subject property with an economical and efficient means of replacing existing sidewalks when a City street tree(s) causes the damage. The City would manage the design, construction, and inspection necessary to repair qualifying sidewalks.

Incentive

- 1. Maximum incentive equivalent to 50% of the actual cost of sidewalk repair subject to a cap of \$1,000 per
- Maximum incentive for income-qualified residents would be 70% of the actual cost of sidewalk repair subject to a cap of \$1,000 per application. Income qualifications would be based on Pasadena Water and Power Electric Assistance Program (UUAP) http://cityofpasadena.net/waterandpower/CARE/

Residential Sidewalk Repair Partnership Program

On April 7, 2009, the City of Enid's Commission passed and approved this Residential Sidewalk Repair Partnership Program (City Code 7-1-6) in order to provide residential property owners an economical and efficient means of repairing or replacing existing sidewalks in residential areas. The City manages the design and construction necessary to repair qualifying sidewalks. Qualified residential property owners may partner with the City for a 50/50 cost share of the repairs.

QUALIFICATIONS:

- Property must be located within City limits
- Property shall have been developed with sidewalks, or the properties on either side of the subject property have or have been developed with sidewalks
- Property owner(s) shall agree to all terms and conditions
- Property owner(s) shall provide matching funds prior to construction.
- Other criteria may apply, see Application for full details.

50/50 Sidewalk Program

SPLITTING THE COST

The City government has miles of sidewalks in need of repair and finite resources with which to work. The Public Works Department, therefore, must set priorities. We put the worst sidewalks at the front of the list along with high-use sidewalks, sidewalks near schools and sidewalks which we know must serve specific persons with disabilities.

The funding limitations prompted the City to create another route to sidewalk repair in which residential property owners share cost of sidewalks. It's called the 50-50 Sidewalk

Replacement Program. Under the 50-50 program, the City pays half the cost of a sidewalk that could use repair but does not make our priority list.



* How much do we have?

The City sets aside money - \$50,000 - to match property owners who otherwise wouldn't meet city criteria for sidewalk replacement.

Property owners interested in participating pay nothing and risk nothing when they apply. Nor are they obligated to go through with the program once a cost is calculated. Here are some basic questions and answers about the 50-50 program.

What is the 50/50 Sidewalk Program?

The program is an annual cost-sharing program in which property owner and the City of Bloomington will split the cost of replacing a public sidewalk. The program is on a first come, first served basis and is open until funding runs out for the current fiscal year.

How can I tell if my sidewalk meets your criteria for 50-50?

The best way is to apply. After an onsite inspection, the City's staff will notify the property owner with a letter, which will include an estimate for the repairs.

Who is eligible for the program?

Any residential property owner is eligible for the 50/50 Sidewalk Program.

What is the process?

- 2. After the request is made, City staff will evaluate your sidewalk
- 3. You will be contacted by mail if your sidewalk qualifies for the 50-50 program

How much does sidewalk replacement cost?

Sidewalks vary in width and length and prices change annually. The best estimate is done on site.

Am I obligated to participate?

No. After the on-site inspection, the property owners can either chose to participate in the program by paying their share of the cost to the City or decline to participate by not responding.

After receiving a letter granting eligibility, when is the deadline for the money?

The City has to have all work completed by the end of the fiscal year (April 30). In order to ensure the work is completed by the end of the fiscal year, the last day the City will accept money is March 15 of each year.

However, the funds are limited and the program could be closed before March 15.



Will they start work on my sidewalk before receiving my share of the cost?

No Sidewalk replacement won't occur until the property owner pays the share of the cost. After the City receives the property owner's share, the City will begin work on the sidewalk within 30 days.

What are the methods of payment?

Should residents choose to participate, they have the option to pay by check, cash, or credit card (Visa or MasterCard). Checks may be sent to:

Will the City repair driveway approaches or aprons?

No. While driveway approaches or aprons are in the public right-of-way, they are the responsibility of the property owner. A city contractor can be hired, but the property owners must coordinate the schedule themselves and will be responsible for paying all the costs.

Will the City replace curbs?

7

No. Curb replacement is not eligible under the 50/50 Sidewalk Program. $\sqrt[9]{6}$

Can I do the repairs myself?

The City discourages residents from replacing City sidewalks outside the City sidewalk program because the City does not inspect their construction projects to ensure the quality of that work and the work must be compliant with state and local city codes. Property owners must use a bonded/license sidewalk contractor approved by the City and must obtain a permit with the City. In addition, property owners are responsible for 100 percent of the cost of the sidewalk replacement and will not be reimbursed for any costs incurred by the sidewalk replacement.

CONDITIONS

- This program is designed to replace older public sidewalks in the City.
 - 2. This program will not cover new sidewalks, driveways or sidewalks from the public sidewalk to the dwelling or business.
- This program will provide a 50% rebate, up to \$500 per property.
 - 4. All sidewalk replacement and repairs will be consistent with the following City Specifications:
 - a. 3500 psi concrete mix
 - b. 4 foot minimum width, except where the entire sidewalk on the block is less than 4', but not less than 3' in width.
 - c. 4 inches in thickness
 - d. Wire mesh reinforcement
 - e. Run from property line to property line.
 - f. Have an expansion joint (felt) at each property line and each side of the driveway.
 - g. All old sidewalk debris shall be removed from the site and disposed of.
 - h. Fill dirt shall be placed along all sidewalk edges.

Sidewalk repairs shall comply with the above specifications, except the 4 foot width requirement, if the existing public sidewalk is smaller than 4 feet, and only one or two sections of the entire sidewalk is to be repaired. This exception shall be determined on a case by case basis.

- 6. The Inspection Department will have the authority to recommend replacement of the entire sidewalk upon inspection instead of repairs to specific sidewalk sections.
- 7. All sidewalk replacement and repairs shall be completed within 30 days after notification of the Inspection Department.

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PROCEDURE

- 1. The property owner shall submit a request for matching funds on a form provided by the Inspection Department.
- 2. The form shall be returned to the Inspection Department.
- 3. The Inspection Department will inspect the sidewalk, note all conditions, mark those sections needing replacement with bright color type paint and photograph the sidewalk. A different color of paint shall be used for each address and the color noted on the Inspection Form and/or Construction Permit.
- 4. The Inspection Department will make a recommendation to the approving authority to grant the rebate on the repair and/or replacement of the entire sidewalk.
- 5. The Inspection Department will forward the form and photograph to the approving authority.
- 6. The approving authority will approve and deny the request and return the form to the Inspection Department.
- 7. The Inspection Department will inform the property owner and prepare a Construction Permit to replace the sidewalk.
- 8. The Inspection Department will inspect the final sidewalk to determine compliance with City specifications.
- 9. The property owner shall verify the cost of the sidewalk replacement by providing the Inspection Department with a signed contract, copy of a canceled check and/or material bills for the entire sidewalk replacement.
- 10. The Inspection Department will certify to the approving authority that the work has been completed and the amount of payment to be made to the property owner.
- 11. The City reserves the right to turn down any request whereby the cost of construction is considerably higher than the City's Contractor price for the same mount of sidewalk replacement.
- 12. The City reserves the right to turn down any request whereby the cost of construction is considerably higher than normal.
- 13. The owner or contractor is responsible for the removal and disposal of all old concrete and construction debris.

New Sidewalks need to be installed from the corner of 2700 E. and South Weber Drive,		
extending due East until joining with the sidewalks in front of the new HighMark Charter		
School.		
Currently, there is no safe way for residents to reach the new charter school by foot from this		
location.		
Many city residents access South Weber Drive via 2700 E for running, biking and other		
activities and this corner has always been a little scary given the lack of shoulder/biking lane		
(that exist further along South Weber Drive) or a sidewalk to navigate safely on.		
This corner receives a heavy amount of traffic in the mornings and it will only be increased		
during peak commuting hours due to parents from other cities driving in to drop off their		
students at the charter school.		
Our local residents and students who are attending the Charter School, should have the option		
to walk or ride bikes to school, and do so in a safe manner. New sidewalks at this location are		
vital to ensuring that they do so.


